Jacqueline Austin Brooks is the daughter of the late Bernice Austin Alexander and the late Mr. William Bray. We know her as Jackie Austin.

She was raised in the crossroads community by her grandmother the late Mrs. Willi Lee Austin. She received most of her schooling at South Macon High School and graduated as the class valedictorian in 1986. She also served as the 1986 Miss South Macon.

Superintendent

Mr. Richard Dennis began serving as Superintendent of Education for Elmore County in January 2017. He previously served as Principal for 5 years at Prattville High School, Principal for 7 years at Wetumpka High School and before that Principal at Holtville High School for 6 ½ years. He also served as an Assistant Principal at Holtville High School for 2 ½ years and a Teacher at Millbrook Middle School for 6 years, all in Elmore County. Mr. Dennis is a graduate of The University of Alabama where he obtained his Bachelor of Science Degree in Secondary Education, English and History. He achieved his Master of Arts Degree at Troy University Montgomery in English Education. He then obtained his Education Administration Certification in 1994 from Auburn University Montgomery. He has served on many Panels and Advisory Committees in Elmore County. He is a member of The National Association of Secondary Schools Principals, Alabama Education Association, The Council for Leaders in Alabama Schools, Alabama Association of Secondary School Principals, State Superintendents Association, and the Alabama High School Athletic Association Board, Mr. Dennis has experience in AdvancED Engagement Reviews, having participated on school reviews as a teacher and an administrator. Over the last two or three years, Mr. Dennis has traveled to China with College Board's Bridge Builders delegation for a tour the of Chinese education system and to Australia with the LEAP's exchange program with an Australian education director.

Mr. Dennis has been married to Leslie H. Dennis and they have four children, twins, Forrest and Ethan, Jacob, and a daughter, Laura Grace. All four children are currently in college – two at the University of Alabama and two at Troy University.





**Dr. Chuck Ledbetter**Superintendent

Chuck Ledbetter, superintendent of Pike Road City Schools since June 1, 2017, has been an educator for 32 years. A graduate of Auburn High School, he attended Furman University and played football for the Paladins as a freshman, then graduated from Auburn University with a B.A. in history. Dr. Ledbetter taught high school history and government while also coaching football and basketball. He earned a master of education in history from Auburn-Montgomery and a doctorate of education in educational leadership from Auburn University. He completed the University of Alabama Superintendent Academy and the Texas Superintendent Academy.

As superintendent of Dublin, GA schools for over six years Ledbetter led the school system to great improvement. The system became a charter system and partnered with neighboring systems to create a regional charter career academy. School choice for all students, academically themed elementary schools, International Baccalaureate programs, project-based learning through all grades, and expanded after school and summer programs are some examples of the way students were engaged in rigorous educational opportunities. These changes produced results, despite a high poverty rate among students. Discipline incidences were reduced in elementary schools by 77%. In six years, Dublin High School increased its graduation rate from 59% to 94.1%. Dublin High had the highest graduation rate in the area for 4 consecutive years. Standardized test scores increased in every school, and Dublin High School was recognized by US News and World Report as a Best High Schools Bronze Award winner for 2013 and 2015.

In Dothan, Dr. Ledbetter led a community discussion about how schools can best serve the students and the city. This work led to a plan for Dothan City Schools to provide more challenging learning opportunities for students. Installation of STEM labs in middle schools and extended STEM hands-on learning in all schools were implemented, and the system successfully completed AdvancED accreditation renewal.

Pike Road Schools is the fastest growing school district in Alabama. During Ledbetter's tenure they have achieved AdvancEd accreditation with one of the highest scores in the state, been named an A+ School of Excellence for Advance Placement scores, and grown from one campus to three. In 2020 Pike Road graduated its first senior class with the 4th highest graduation rate in Alabama and a top 20 ACT average score.

Chuck Ledbetter was a history teacher for 11 years, an assistant principal, a middle school principal, a high school principal, assistant superintendent for curriculum and for finance, and superintendent. He serves on the boards of the School Superintendents of Alabama, the Council for Leaders of Alabama Schools, and is the president of the AASA Century Club 100, a group of superintendents made up of two from each state who meet to discuss education issues.





**Dr. Ann Roy Moore**Superintendent

Dr. Ann Roy Moore is a teacher. For more than four decades, Dr. Moore has educated the children of Alabama. From her first post as a pre-school teacher, to her administrative work as a principal, central office curriculum specialist, superintendent, and her mentoring the next generation of teachers as an adjunct professor at colleges and universities, teaching is her passion.

"Even while serving as superintendent for a decade in Huntsville City Schools - I was still a teacher at heart," said Dr. Moore. "I am always looking for teachable moments to share with administrators and staff. Perhaps more importantly, I am constantly searching for the opportunity to learn and grow myself. Good teachers are also lifelong learners. Ensuring our teachers and administrators have the opportunity to continue to grow and learn while they work to educate our students is critical."

Before becoming the superintendent for Huntsville City Schools, she served in several roles there including deputy superintendent, elementary education manager, principal, and teacher. Dr. Moore also worked as a teacher, and later an assistant superintendent, for Florence City Schools. Her professorships include work at Alabama A&M University, Athens State College, Shoals Community College, and the University of North Alabama.

"I am so pleased to have been named the Superintendent of Montgomery Public Schools," said Dr. Moore. "We have many challenges, but there is great potential here. We have a supportive board, caring teachers, strong administrators, and most of all, people with a passion to make our schools the best they can be. We are going to work hard to help our students reach their potential."

Dr. Moore earned a Bachelor's Degree in Early Childhood Education from Hampton University, a Master's Degree in Elementary Education and an Education Specialist Degree from the University of North Alabama. Her Educational Doctorate in Curriculum Leadership Personnel and Early Childhood Education is from the George Peabody College of Vanderbilt University. She also earned A and AA Certification and K-12 Superintendency Certification from Alabama A&M University.

She has earned numerous awards for her work in education and in the community including being named the Alabama Superintendent of the Year in 2008. Dr. Moore is also an accomplished musician – serving as her church's organist.

Dr. Moore was named Montgomery Public Schools superintendent in May of 2018.
